### **OUTCOME 1:**


Children, young people and the wider school community know about and understand the UN Convention on the

Rights of the Child and can describe how it impacts on their lives and on the lives of children everywhere.

After achieving the Silver level in 2018, we celebrated and publicised our achievement and began work on our gold action plan, feeding in the recommendations from our Silver assessment report.



In a survey carried out by the Ambassadors in June 2022, 92% of pupils responded that 'yes', they learn about rights at school and 8% answered 'sometimes'.




Our steering group have a central role in helping pupils know about their rights. One pupil from each class is voted for by their peers and they meet weekly with Mrs Lane, the Rights Champion.



The ABCDE of rights is a regular focus of assemblies and is displayed in classrooms, as well as in the entrance hall.

When Year 3 pupils start at Uplands, they are soon introduced to the rights in the UN convention and are taught how these link to our needs. We have a good range of resources such as the 'wants' and 'needs' cards from UNICEF which encourage lots of interaction and debate.

#### Geography

There will be lots happening in Geography this year at Uplands. As a school we are moving towards more outdoor learning experiences within this subject as well as making cross curricular links with Geography and other subjects.

Outdoor learning has proven to:

- enhanced personal and social communication skills.
- increased physical health.
- enhanced mental and spiritual health.
- enhanced spiritual, sensory, and aesthetic awareness

Uplands participates in the national Outdoor Classroom Days (November and May) and last year the children enjoyed these days thoroughly.

This academic year we will also be studying Earth Day and World Ocean Day.

Through study of the Global Goals and Geography we aim to help the children to become more environmentally aware citizens who are educated in sustainability as well as learning about physical Geography.

The ambassadors select a different article to be a 'Right of the Month.' They use the resources on the RRSA web-site to present this to their class. Very often, this will encourage discussion, display work (such as the work below) and enable pupils to express their views.





Our Mascot Rocky, the Rights-Respecting Raccoon, helps pupils to understand the individual articles.














Rights of the month for April are 38 and 39, linking in with events in Ukraine. As this is a worrying





#### **Policy Statement**

Mental health is a state of well-being in which every individual realises his or her own potential, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to her or his community. (World Health Organization 2015)



We set up a <u>Playground Charter</u> which is regularly reviewed. Pupils understand that following the promises is enabling a more fun, safe and fair breaktime for all.





Children and young people are safe and protected and know what to do if they need support.





### OUTCOME 5: Children's social and emotional wellbeing is a priority. They learn to develop healthy lifestyles.

Our Health Champions have been doing amazing work on helping pupils to develop healthy lifestyles, working with a range of outside agencies (Public Health and the School Nursing Service) and leading an annual Health week. Here is a snapshot of their activities.



vesterday. Colleagues from Public Health and the Wolverhampton 0-19 School Nursing Service have been delivering a pilot health champion programme to measure the impact and outcomes of young people leading and delivering Health Campaigns and awareness on priorities for Children and Young People Schools and Communities

Sunita Pallan-Jhalli, Senior Public Health Specialist, who delivers the scheme, welcomed the year 6 students to feedback on the success of their recent campaign for anti-bullying week in November During anti-bullying week the students hosted a guiz, presented an assembly that included a video they had scripted themselves to raise awareness, shared a poem written by one of the champions, and wrote a letter to parents.

Comparing the answers to their pre and post-campaign surveys, they could determine the

- The percentage of students saying they had been bullied online did not increase
- The percentage of students who knew who to tell if they were bullied online increased from 92% to 95%
- The percentage of students who knew where to get help and support with online bullying increased from 76% to 90%
- The percentage of students who would not provide personal information to someone online

A big congratulations and well done to the Health Champions for their hard work and dedication on this campaign . It's clear to see that the resources created and shared with other students helped raise awareness of bullying and inform them on what someone should do should they be

And now there's no stopping them. Planning has commenced for their next campaign in February for Children's Mental Health Week. Keep your eyes peeled for more information to follow in the

All work for the campaign has been devised by the Health Champions themselves and focuses on raising awareness and signposting young people to services available to them.


This week we will also share information for parents which includes signs to look out for and where to seek help if you feel your child is being bullied while online gaming.





### OUTCOME 6

Children and young people are included and are valued as individuals.

Our weekly awards assembly celebrates achievement across range of areas, not just academic. Over the year, all pupils are included and are also given opportunities to select their peers for rewards.

Each Friday we hold an Awards assembly at Uplands-one for lower school and one for upper school. Certificates are given for good work and respectful behaviour, an attendance cup is awarded to the best attending class for the week (plus some extra play!), there are lunchtime awards, Mathletics awards, house points, awards for activities out of school and Name in the jar prize draws. A new feature for this year is the 'Being brilliant' award linked to the Art of Brilliance. Each week in every class a child is chosen at random-the pupils together with the teacher decide what makes that particular child 'brilliant' and writes on the back of the certificate-this is then read out in Assembly. Over the year every pupil will receive this award as part of raising self esteem and feeling proud to be yourself.





Every month, a new artist is selected by our Art Champion as a focus and she ensures a diverse range of subjects are chosen in terms of gender, background, culture and religion. It is important that all of our pupils can recognise themselves in some of the artists who are studied.



We always celebrate Black History month in our lessons and assemblies.

### Take one picture

This antumn we launched our brand new annual art project called 'Uplands Take One Pictures.' All children completed one piece of artwork during the week beginning 8th November, taking their inspiration from Sri. Madhavan's painting 'Young woman with Krishna.' to link in with the firstival of Diwali and to reflect the diverse make up of our school population. Some fantastic work was produced and we are sure that the children were keen to share their work with you all too. We will repeat this next year with a focus on a different culture. The recent homework that pupils have completed about their background has been just fabulous and we intend to create a central display to celebrate our school's diversity.

In addition, during this week all pupils took part in a drumming workshop led by "Hit the Dohl" which was fully funded by school. Great enjoyment was had by all. Newsletter extract sharing how we value the diversity of backgrounds and cultures in our school.





We are delighted to be able to resume our visits to local places of worship. Year 5 are first and will soon be visiting the Madina Masjid. Also this term, Year 6 will be visiting the Shree Krishna Mandir. In the Spring term, Year 3's trip is to the Tegh Bahadur Gurdwara and Year 4 go to St Philip's Church.

All visits take place on the morning when pupils would usually have their RE lessons and we are always back in time for lunch as normal.

These visits are enjoyable and enriching for our pupils, consolidating the learning of our RE lessons and allowing opportunities for pupils to hear from members of the religion being studied. 
### OUTCOME 7

Children and young people value education and are involved in making decisions about their education.

SLT and subject leaders undertake annual pupil voice questionnaires to ascertain next steps in all areas of the curriculum. This has had a big impact across all year groups and subjects, in terms of the types of activities and topics covered.



When the campaign started in 1988 there were 1000 new cases in the world every day. To date in 2022 there have been just 2 cases.








